Thank you for visiting the Pomeroy
Academia Covered Bridge! We're sure
you'll agree this is a peaceful and
serene setting, perfect for
Pennsylvania's longest covered bridge.
Built in 1902 by James N. Groninger, it
is a double span, Burr Arch Truss
Bridge built on the designs of Theodore
Burr [1771-1822] who was the
preeminent bridge architect and
builder of his time. Burr developed an
arch and truss design that was
patented in 1804 that came to be
known as the Burr truss. The bridge is
278'4" long and originally cost \$6484.

Its restoration was completed in 2008 by the Juniata County Historical Society after an 8 year \$1.4 M project.





One questions consistently asked is why there are surveillance cameras on the bridge; the answer is sobering. Within weeks of its completion someone set fire to a piece of clothing; fortunately it charred only a few of the floorboards before it went out. Several days later several individuals came onto the bridge and spray painted graffiti. The Historical Society decided at that time that we had to invest in a surveillance system to protect the bridge from this kind of vandalism.

Covered bridges are targets for arsonists and arson is the number one cause for the decreasing number of covered bridges in Pennsylvania. Recently in November 2014 an arsonist destroyed the Dellville Bridge in Perry County, PA.



"I come here a lot. The covered bridge has become a safe place, life hasn't always been kind or clear or warm. I don't know whose idea it was to keep, restore and maintain the bridge but I want to thank them personally now and this note is how I'll do it. This bridge is so much more than just a bridge."

We welcome you and hope you enjoy our beautiful bridge. If the spirit moves you to make a donation to the bridge maintenance fund we will certainly appreciate it. Covered bridges are like old houses, there is always something to fix, mend or replace. Because of the dual threat of arson and insect damage we plan within 5-6 years to treat the bridge again with an insect deterrent and a fire retardant. This is an expensive project to undertake as the chemicals must not get into the Tuscarora Creek; the special precautions necessary to prevent contamination of the creek make this project costly. Likewise maintenance of the stone pier and abutments is ongoing and in the future we must plan for a refurbishment of the stonework.
